A mother, with her hands full of bags and a young son in tow, was walking out of a grocery store when her son spotted a youth group selling chocolate bars for a dollar. As expected, he began begging his mom to buy him the candy. His mother explained that she had spent all her money on groceries and had no extra money to buy the candy. An elderly man, overhearing the conversation, pulled a dollar bill out of his pocket and offered it to the boy. In 1863 Abraham Lincoln established Thanksgiving as a National Holiday. Since that time it has been a day of thanks. However, for many, it is simply the beginning of the Holiday Season; A day for football, or a time to gather with family and friends and enjoy a holiday meal, or the day before Christmas shopping officially begins. As Knights Templar, and followers of Christ, we should be thankful for all that God has done, and continues to do, for us. And we should be displaying that thankfulness through both gratitude to God, and service to those around us who need to experience the love of God.

This Thanksgiving season, in fact, throughout the year, try to look to see where God's hand is at work in your life and offer up praise and thanksgiving to Him. And always remember that a thankful heart is a joyful heart.
