Enter his gates with thanksgiving and his courts with praise; give thanks to him and praise his name. For the LORD is good and his love endures forever; his faithfulness continues through all generations."

For all that Thanksgiving brings with it, there is one fact that remains unchanged year in and year out: God's goodness. The Greek word for goodness is 'agathosune'. It describes an active goodness. God seeks to do good things because it is in his very nature to do so. He wants to bless us, embrace us, and care for us. He longs to show his goodness to us.

Thankfulness is a choice and gratitude is an attitude. And we have the opportunity to make those decisions every day. No matter what our circumstances are, we have a lot to be thankful for. And our personalities will become more appealing when we accurately reflect God's goodness with our lives. When we have an attitude of thankfulness, we become grateful people, and that helps us to point people to Jesus, giving us the desire to serve others as thankful people wishing to be joyful builders of what God has in store for others.

This Thanksgiving, as you celebrate with family, friends, food and festivities, don't forget to take time to treasure God's goodness to you.
