

Where are the Wise Men?

Happy New Year. I hope that everyone had a wonderful Christmas. We are now in January, when many Christians celebrate Epiphany, also known as Three Kings Day, which is the feast day commemorating the visit of the Magi, or Wise Men, to the Christ Child.

The wise men are a part of our Christmas story as they hold a prominent place in our nativity scenes and pictures, even though we know that they most likely arrived sometimes later. The timing doesn't matter as much as the fact that they did come. We don't know how many there were in their entourage.
